Explanatory Note

To enable Potatoes NZ to continue to engage in the GIA process, it must prove it has a mandate from the sector to sign the GIA Deed.

The GIA Deed establishes the basis for a transparent, consistent and equitable partnership to improve biosecurity outcomes including engagement across the end-to-end biosecurity system as well as joint decision-making and sharing of costs for agreed readiness and response activities for unwanted organisms.

The Deed provides for the development of Operational Agreements (OAs). These are effectively contracts between parties to a specific agreement to undertake activities that deliver an agreed biosecurity outcome that enhances readiness and/or response.

It is important to understand that as specific costs are agreed in the OA, Potatoes NZ Inc. does not have to commit to any cost shared activities until it signs an Operational Agreement for joint readiness work or until response cost sharing begins in 2017.

- Readiness cost sharing commences from 1 July 2014, with transitional discounts applying to July 2020.
- Response cost sharing commences from 1 July 2017, with funding transition applying from July 2017 to July 2023. Minimum commitments are not eligible for cost-sharing.

As a safeguard to our industry's financial commitment, the Biosecurity Act allows Potatoes NZ Inc. to set a fiscal cap.

As a Deed Signatory, an industry organisation makes a future commitment to:

- Cost share any biosecurity response that it benefits from up to the level of its fiscal cap, starting from mid-2017.
- Pay its share for activities agreed in any Operational Agreement signed with MPI, from mid-2014.

In return, Potatoes NZ gets:

- A seat at the response decision table with MPI and other affected industries, so you can have a say in what will be done when an unwanted organism impacting our industry is found.
- Access to the transitional discounts and the 50% cap on industry's share of readiness and response costs offered to Deed Signatories by government.
- Access to a crown loan (as a last resort) to fund a response up-front, from mid-2017.
- A meeting with MPI at least once a year to work through the potato sector's biosecurity risk profile, discuss how these risks are being managed and discuss whether the risks could be managed better
- A say in how the Deed is implemented through a seat on the Deed Governance Group

What if Potatoes NZ Inc. doesn't sign:

- If PNZ Inc. decides to undertake any readiness activities, it will have to fund these wholly from member levies and will not have access to Government co-funding.
- PNZ Inc. will not have any role in deciding whether a response to a pest incursion is initiated, how that response is carried out, or how much is spent on the programme.
- Government will be able to impose a compulsory biosecurity levy to recover the costs of a response, and PNZ Inc. will have no ability to set maximum limits (fiscal caps) on the amount spent on a response. There is therefore no opportunity to limit the financial liability of the industry or have a say in how a response is conducted.

We understand that many in the industry may still have reservations about paying for a response, being part of the decision-making process offers value – including taking part in decisions to initiate or cease a response.

MOTION 4 FUNDING OF DISTRICT ASSOCIATIONS

- a) **THAT** a system of grants be established for the funding of District Associations.
- b) THAT Horticulture Canterbury Growers Society Ltd asks that Potatoes NZ Inc., Vegetables NZ, Process Vegetables NZ, Onions NZ, Tomatoes NZ, The Buttercup and Squash Council and the Asparagus Council members be asked to decide that the recent decision made by the PG Chairman's Forum to phase out the current Grant system to District Associations is not in the best long term interests of NZ Growers and that the grants continue.

The Chief Executive advised that there has been much debate on how this funding should be distributed and a resolution has been developed.

This year full payment has been made. However, from 1 July 2013, the total funds available will be limited to \$30k. There are 2 application levels, \$5k and \$10k, and the capped level will be agreed each year. Applications must be received by 31 May each year. It is proposed that a policy will be in place in 12 months.

District Associations will top up this funding from their operational funds as needed.

Chairman's Annual Report - 2014

The 2013/14 year has seen a major review of Potatoes NZ Inc. The board instructed our CEO, Champak Mehta, to review all our operations and implement change where required to deliver a much leaner and responsive grower funded organisation. Following on from the completion of PNZ Inc.'s Strategic Plan last year, we are now well positioned to implement policy which will start to deliver greater benefits to our levy payers.

Key to this was the decision to contract the Foundation of Arable Research (FAR) to manage our Research and Development budget. FAR has a well established reputation for delivering excellent research to arable farmers and is highly regarded both within New Zealand and overseas. The board considered FAR a natural partner for PNZ Inc. as the majority of our farmers already have a relationship with FAR as arable levy payers. R & D is our largest budgeted expense and over the coming years we are confident we will see enhanced returns to our growers from this alliance.

During the first months of 2014 the board reviewed the structure and refreshed the composition of our subcommittees. All subcommittees now have a board member on them and we have limited all participants to serving on only one committee. I would like to thank all those who have served on these groups for the work they have done, particularly the chairmen.

As the board has clearly shown it is committed to structuring an effective and accountable PNZ Inc. I would like to take this opportunity to assure growers and trade members that we will continue to follow that policy and effect change if it is required to deliver a better outcome for all our members.

My thanks as chairman to our staff, Champak Mehta and Andrea Crawford for their outstanding work during the year and to the board for their continued support as we have challenged vigorously the status quo.

At this year's AGM Kevin Balle is standing down as a board member. It is appropriate to acknowledge the outstanding contribution Kevin has made to PNZ Inc. His knowledge and understanding of the industry is second to none plus he brings mana and experience that will be difficult to replace. Thank you Kevin for your input, your wisdom and the time you put aside to contribute to PNZ Inc. as a board member.

Education & Marketing Group (Chairperson – Ian Corbett)

This year saw a change in the Education & Marketing Group structure and a new group of people adding a wide range of skills and experience. Pip Duncan was contracted as Marketing & Education Manager, Joanna Growchowicz is the Marketing Communications Specialist and Andrea Crawford, who holds a Marketing degree, re-joined PNZ Inc. as Business Manager.

One of the major activities in 2014 has been the completion of the Nielsen Consumer Research project, of which the results have provided significant insights into the potato buying behaviour of consumers.

Whilst the Statistics New Zealand Household Economic Survey officially named potatoes as the country's favourite vegetable in January - with \$119 million worth of potatoes being sold in the year to June 2013 - it appears from the Nielsen study that consumption is declining especially in the young household and under 35 categories.

The research led to the development of a set of key messages to be used consistently across all channels to engage target demographics highlighted in the survey. **The "four pillars" or key messages are:**

- **Versatility** potatoes can be used in a variety of ways and in a wide range of potato "occasions"
- **Convenience** potatoes are ready to cook, best cooked in their skins, can be eaten hot at dinner and cold for tomorrows lunch.
- **Nutrition** potatoes are a good source of Vitamin C, fibre, folate and other key elements. They offer more nutritional value than competing carbohydrates such as rice and pasta and they are naturally gluten, fat and cholesterol free.
- **Sustainable** potatoes are grown locally so minimise the "food miles" and they require less water to produce than rice or pasta.

Once the key messages were confirmed the www.potatoes.co.nz website was fully revamped and moved to a Content Management System, allowing savings to be made on its maintenance as well as affording greater flexibility with content. All content was reviewed and updated along with an increased focus on the target age groups with wider content added for the professionals sector.

A continued focus of activity surrounding the key influencers such as the food writers and training institutions has resulted in valuable media exposure – such as The Healthy Food Guide double page spread in December issue and a recent Food magazine article by Sophie Gray featuring six pages on potatoes - reinforcing our key messages.

Work with the training institutions continues with Potatoes NZ Inc. sponsoring the 2014 National Secondary Schools Culinary Challenge and the 2014 Culinary Fare: these provide an opportunity to work with the upcoming chefs and to showcase potatoes in the recipes at these events.

This year has seen refresh of the children's activities. The partnership with STAND – Children's Health Camps continues to flourish with all the resources being updated and PNZ Inc. working with other STAND sponsors on developing the Spudtacular programme within the STAND villages. As the resources are modified, there is an opportunity to roll out the Spudtacular concept to other children's services such as holiday and Christian camps, schools and holiday programme providers.

Potatoes NZ is now part of the NZ Nutrition Foundation's "Just Cook" programme which is designed to show families home-cooked meals can be cheap, quick and enjoyed by the whole family. It utilises internet based resources and is aimed at the children conveying the messages to the parents.

A recent addition to our children's portfolio is our participation in the Garden to Table programme through the provision of teaching resources. This is currently operating in 23 schools around New Zealand and has a further 60 schools on its waiting list seeking to secure funding to participate. This programme targets children aged 6 to 12 years and aims to empower children for a better future by providing them with skills to grow and prepare food to share with family. Other organisations are also operating within the school system and we aim to provide resources to their programmes where possible to ensure maximum coverage and penetration for minimal cash investment.

The key to communicating the nutritional benefits of potatoes has been to work closely with dieticians and nutritionists, gaining their support for potatoes in a balanced diet. The research report by C. Lister on "The Composition and Health Benefits of Potatoes" (2009-2013) has been updated to form the basis of potato specific health claims, which have gone to the Ministry of Primary Industries for approval and will be rolled out shortly. We also worked with Jenni Pearce and 25 nutritionists at High Performance Sport N.Z. where we have provided resources and are working on developing specific recipes for their use.

Networking around co-marketing opportunities continues with other primary industry marketing organisations such as Beef+Lamb and Chicken New Zealand.

As the team gather more momentum and creates more awareness in a wider audience, PNZ Inc. is now being approached with a variety of opportunities to promote potatoes and we are constantly having to carefully balance these opportunities with our limited funding and our key target demographics to ensure we get the "best bang for your buck".

Export Market Development Group (Chairperson – Bharat Bhana)

The EMDG works in three main areas: market access, market development, and market information. In the past year the focus of market access has been new access for potatoes to Vietnam, processing potatoes to Australia, and improved potato access to Korea.

The EMDG and MPI facilitated a visit by Vietnamese officials in late 2013. This was extremely helpful and resulted in requirements for fresh potatoes for consumption and processing being separated from the more restrictive seed potato requirements. Vietnam has provided a set of revised import conditions recently and these are currently under consideration.

Access to Australia for fresh potatoes for processing has been stalled yet again, with the Senate Select Committee reviewing the draft decision to allow the importation of potatoes for processing and recommending that the Australian Department of Agriculture conduct a full Import Risk Analysis. This market access request is being subjected to significant opposition from Australian industry representatives, with great emphasis being unjustifiably placed on the import risk from fresh potatoes for consumption not processing.

The EMDG also reviews existing market access requirements with a view to improvement where possible. It commissioned research on the efficacy of washing and use of other post-harvest treatments for removing PCN cysts as an effective post-harvest treatment. This research will form the basis of a proposal to the Republic of Korea (and potentially other markets) to reduce the soil testing requirements.

The EMDG is involved in the implementation phase of the MPI Certification Review Project through its representation on the Plants Market Access Council (PMAC). The review covers all MPI standards, guidelines and official assurance programmes.

Market development activities have included the development of a Leadership Programme. This aims to expose industry members to a structured programme of leadership development and learning focusing on understanding export markets, identifying the challenges and opportunities, and creating innovative business model solutions to assist the New Zealand potato industry and associated firms exploit these market opportunities.

The EMDG also provides market information, such as weekly fresh potato export statistics and monthly processed export statistics and maintains a quick reference guide to importing country phytosanitary requirements (New Zealand can currently export fresh potatoes to more than 35 countries).

Leadership Development Group (Chairperson – Nick Tayler)

Potatoes NZ Inc. has proudly continued its support of the Young Grower of the Year competition. The potato industry was well represented in the 2013 Young Vegetable Grower of the Year finals with Dave Winter being announced the winner at the Gala Dinner Awards and representing the vegetable growers in the national Young Grower of the Year finals in Wellington. In 2014 Young Vegetable Grower of the Year, the potato industry was again represented with two entrants from AS Wilcox (Andrew Hutchinson and Lance Pratt) along with one from Hinemoa Quality Producers (Brett Parker), with Brett going on to win the event.

Potatoes NZ Inc. continues to work closely with Sue Pickering, HortNZ Training Manager providing industry input into recent changes in the Primary ITO and the proposed changes to Lincoln University staff and programme.

The potato industry was represented in the 2013 HortNZ Leadership programme by Scott Rimes, South Island Regional Manager for A S Wilcox & Sons. As part of the Leadership Programme Scott was able to attend a HortNZ Board meeting and the following day a Product Group Chairs meeting with the PNZ Inc. Chair and CEO in Wellington during late October 2013.

Paul Olsen, a potato grower from Opiki, joined the elite list of Nuffield Scholars in New Zealand with the announcement of five scholarship winners in November 2013. The Nuffield NZ Scholarship offers Paul the opportunity for study of the latest developments in a number of leading agricultural countries. We wish Paul all the success in his travels and hope that he is able to utilise his learnings within the potato industry in future years.

Following on from the inaugural Agronomists' Forum held in 2012, the second Potatoes New Zealand Inc. (PNZ Inc.) Agronomists Forum was held immediately prior to the PNZ Inc. annual conference on 30 July 2013. Thirty-one people attended (including eight speakers) and PNZ Inc. was fortunate enough to obtain generous sponsorship from Peracto NZ and Talleys. Topics included on-farm productivity, psyllid and Resource Management Act issues.

The forum suggested that a system could be set up to register agronomists, set criteria for being fully employed in potato agronomy, and use a points system to maintain registration through ongoing work in potatoes, course attendance – e.g., the UK BASIS programme. This could link into the NZ Institute of Agricultural and Horticultural Science which runs a system for Certified Professional Agronomists (CPAg). This is currently a work in progress and as it develops will be further communicated to the industry.

There are two Forums planned for later in 2014, with the aim being to mix strong technical content with plenty of opportunity to meet with researchers and share ideas.

People in Potatoes meetings were held in October 2013 in Pukekohe and Ashburton, these proved to be a success allowing industry participants to be updated on the latest in research

findings and the industry strategy. Then in early March this year further meetings were held again in Pukekohe and Lincoln, this time in conjunction with the Plant and Food "Potato Field Days". During the meetings CEO, Champak Mehta provided updates on the various industry initiatives and allowed the message to be brought to the wider industry who were represented on the day. A particular thanks to those that braved the stormy weather to travel to Lincoln to attend the presentations.

New Zealand Seed Potato Certification Authority (Chairperson – Andy Innes)

The New Zealand Seed Potato Certification Authority has been in a period of consolidation this past year. We have a sustainable seed potato certification scheme and, after some fairly radical changes in recent years, we have tried to slow down the pace of change, make sure we have good management processes in place, and communicate better with industry members. I hope you feel we have achieved this.

Part of the consolidation was to ensure that the scheme is well managed and administered. To make this happen the Authority contracted Market Access Solutionz to provide the Secretary role. As Secretary, Dr Stephen Ogden has been working steadily to improve the systems in place for scheme management. This has included developing specifications for field and tuber inspection services and a service specification for the administration of the scheme which form the basis for this year's contracts with AsureQuality and SGS. To ensure that merchant views are also represented, the Board of Potatoes NZ Inc. has also appointed two merchant representatives to the Authority.

The Authority is also determined to consolidate participation in the scheme. By international standards, there is already a high level of participation (80%) for a voluntary scheme, but there is scope to do better. To maximise participation, it is important that the rules and requirements are very clear, are consistently applied, and that there is industry buy-in. The Authority has consciously slowed down the adoption of rule changes so that they can be communicated to growers and seed buyers, and that all participants have an opportunity to comment on the changes. Please read the Potatoes New Zealand Inc. newsletter and have your say.

The standards of the New Zealand Seed Potato Certification Authority are also amongst the highest in the world, and the Authority has appointed a Technical Panel to review the tolerances against international developments. Their advice so far is that most of the tolerances are set at the right level, and have only recommended some minor changes.

The effectiveness of the scheme is also being examined through a virus survey conducted by Dr John Fletcher and his team from Plant and Food Research under contract to Potatoes NZ. Thirty eight seed crops were surveyed. Potato leafroll virus was detected in only three crops at up to 3.5% incidence and PVX, PVY and PVA were present in a few crops usually at low incidence (1-2%). There was only one crop with a high incidence of PVY. In Dr Fletcher's opinion this is a very pleasing result. Full results will be available from Potatoes NZ once the analysis is complete.

A second Technical Panel has been given the task of identifying inconsistencies in the scheme rules and reviewing the format of the rules booklet. The aim is to make the rules easier for everyone to understand and follow, but not to change the meaning of the rules. There has even been a suggestion to bring back the printed rules booklet, and we are looking into the feasibility of doing this.

Finally, we need to remember that the entire potato value chain is underpinned by the quality of seed that our growers of certified seed potatoes produce. We have very good seed growers and a very good certification scheme - let's continue to consolidate past improvements and work

together to make further sensible improvements to the way we produce and certify seed potatoes in New Zealand.

Research & Development (Chairperson – Murray Turley)

Research & development (R&D) is the largest area of expenditure for Potatoes NZ Inc. and a new collaborative partnership with the Foundation for Arable Research (FAR) was announced in late 2013.

Effective from June 2014 this will ensure delivery of on-going, high-quality, cost-effective research aligning potato-specific research with generic research around water, soils, environment and 'right to farm' issues.

During the year many projects neared completion including:

- The SFF funded project into IPM tools for TPP management. This programme is now into its third and final year of research and is all on-track, with the research programme officially finishing in June 2014 and extension activities (such as grower workshops, costbenefit analysis, development of management tools and guidelines) planned for completion by August/September 2014.
- The field trials into ways to reduce agrichemical usage by using predictive models to determine best times to spray, and integrated use of crop oils. These trials are now completed with reporting on the trials scheduled to be available in mid-June.
- The research into effects of insecticides on beneficial insects to support an integrated programme that maximises beneficial insects for TPP control has continued with completion due in mid-June 2014.

In November 2013, Potatoes NZ began posting Psyllid Degree Day graphs on the website, these graphs predict psyllid degree day development in the 5 growing regions: Pukekohe, Hawke's Bay, Manawatu, Mid Canterbury and South Canterbury.

To aid in the consistency and accuracy of the national psyllid monitoring programme, Plant & Food Research prepared an easy to use guide on psyllid trapping and monitoring which was sent to all PNZ Inc. members, growers and agronomists.

Potatoes NZ also supported the Manawatu Potato Growers who have been carrying out an extensive programme of psyllid monitoring for this 2013-14 growing season. PNZ Inc. is assisting this group by funding the analysis and weekly reporting to the group of the psyllid monitoring data and providing funding to monitor an unsprayed potato field.

Along with other product groups, Potatoes NZ was involved in a project to prepare an EPA application for the importation and release of Tamarixia as a biological control agent of psyllid in New Zealand. This project is currently on hold pending a review following the recent outcome of the Tomatoes NZ EPA application for the release of Macrolophus as a BCA for greenhouse whitefly.

Potatoes NZ also participated in The Australian Potato Research Programme (APRP2) which included work on soil-borne diseases, nutrients for potato production, and beneficial insects for TPP control. Work by Dr Paul Horne, looking at beneficial insects for TPP control in NZ was done under this project. Potatoes New Zealand has contributed to this research programme and has access to the research outcomes through the co-funding arrangement.

Unfortunately we were unsuccessful with two SFF applications made this year. PNZ Inc. is not alone as none of the other major vegetable product groups received funding support for their projects either.

The major application was for funding for a research programme to improve potato productivity - building on the recent Potato Yield Gap research.

PNZ Inc. also supported an SFF application by Tararua growers to develop a predictive model to assist in management of the psyllid pest (TPP) in the Manawatu.

Additional research was carried out following requests from other PNZ Inc. sub committees:

- Education & Marketing The composition and health benefits of potatoes—an update (2009-2013) by C E Lister
- Export Market Development Group Postharvest Treatments of Potato Tubers for the Removal of Potato Cyst Nematodes by F A Shah
- Seed Certification Authority A Virus Survey of Seed Potato Generations 2014 by J D Fletcher

Overall a very busy and successful year for potatoes research and development activity.

This being the last report of the Research and Development Investment Group. I would like to acknowledge all that have contributed to the smooth functionality of the Board. Special thanks to Bharat Bhana, Simon Campbell, Nick Taylor as long serving Grower Representatives for making my job easy.

To our service providers being Plant and Food, and Market Access Solutions ably led by Stephen Ogden.

A thank you to Scott Celland and Ross McCallum, we have valued your contribution since you have joined this group.

We are looking forward to a close and successful involvement with FAR in managing the potato industries Research and Development.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the period ending 31 March 2014

1. Reporting Entity

Potatoes New Zealand Incorporated was registered under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 in March 2010. The Incorporation began trading in May 2012.

The financial statements are for the year ended 31 March 2014, with the comparative figures for the eleven-month period ended 31 March 2013.

2. Basis of preparation

a. Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with New Zealand Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (NZGAAP).

b. Basis of Measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical costs basis, except for assets and liabilities that have been measured at fair value.

The accrual basis of accounting has been used unless otherwise stated and the financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

c. Presentation currency

The financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars. All numbers presented have been rounded to the nearest dollar, unless otherwise stated

d. Presentation of Statement of Financial Performance

The recognition and measurement of financial items is consistent with the previous period. However the presentation of the items in the Statement of Financial Performance has been changed (including the comparative period) to enable the readers to better understand aspects of the core activities of the entity and other items comprising the reported result.

e. Differential reporting

Potatoes New Zealand Incorporated qualifies for differential reporting by virtue of its size and the fact that it has no public accountability. Potatoes New Zealand Incorporated has taken advantage of all available differential-reporting exemptions.

3. Significant accounting policies

The significant accounting policies used in the preparation of these financial statements, set out below, have been applied consistently to all years presented in these financial statements.

The significant accounting policies used in the preparation of these financial statements are summarized below:

a. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held on call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

b. Revenue

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to Potatoes New Zealand Inc and the revenue can be easily measured. Revenue is measured at fair value of consideration received.

The following specific recognition criteria must be met before revenue is recognized:

Grants

Grant income is recognized as revenue when received and all associated obligations have been met.

Interest Income

Interest income is recognized as it accrues, using the effective interest rate method.

Fixed Assets

The cost of purchased property, plant and equipment is the value of the consideration given to acquire the assets and to get them to the location and condition necessary for their intended service.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis so as to expense the cost of the assets to their residual values over their useful lives with a depreciation range of 40%

c. Income Tax

Income tax is accounted for by the tax payable method.

d. Goods and Services Tax (GST)

All amounts in these financial statements are shown exclusive of GST, except for receivables and payables that are stated inclusive of GST.

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the Inland Revenue Department (IRD) is included as part of receivables or payables in the Balance Sheet.

Dr Rob Jacobsen is able to speak at the conference thanks to sponsorship from AGMARDT.







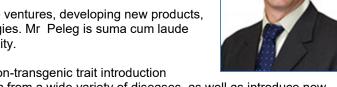
THE AGRICULTURAL AND MARKETING RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT TRUST

Rob's presentation will consider the theory behind IPM and explore ways of using compatible control measures in combination to maintain pest populations below economic damage thresholds. The theory will be supported by examples of successful implementation in commercial crops.

Dotan Peleg, CEO Morflora, Israel

Dotan Peleg joined Morflora after founding and managing several high-tech startups. Formerly CEO of HyNEX, he led the company to a \$127M acquisition by Cisco.

Dotan brings extensive expertise in setting up ventures, developing new products, and breaking into markets with new technologies. Mr Peleg is suma cum laude graduate in Physics from the Tel Aviv University.



Morflora develops a bio-based generic and non-transgenic trait introduction solution into plants and seeds, to protect them from a wide variety of diseases, as well as introduce new desired traits for plant and seed enhancement.

The company targets the seed treatment market, and non-seed and plant treatment markets with plant protection and enhancement solutions in order to reduce dependency on chemical treatments in plants, and increase global crop yield. So far experiments were conducted in vegetables, vines and trees, and response to a number of pathogens, have yielded promising results. The next step is to explore TraitUP's[™] potential as a plant enhancement solution.

Morflora's combination of independent development efforts, the intellectual property it holds, and the knowledge and expertise of its scientists allows for a unique offering and a technological breakthrough which can significantly affect a wide variety of agricultural markets. TraitUP[™] is a patent-pending technology developed at the Hebrew University by Prof. Haim Rabinowitch and Prof. Ilan Sela. The patents are co-owned by Morflora and Yissum and under exclusive licensing agreement with Yissum (Yissum is the technology transfer arm of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem). Established in 2008, the company is supported by private investors.

Phil Turner – Fonterra

Philip is a seasoned executive with Fonterra and a former diplomat, with wide experience in business management, strategy, trade policy and government.

Since late 2013 Philip has been based in Auckland leading business transformation, with a particular focus on improving Fonterra's global processes and systems.

His return to NZ follows seven years offshore in Asia. He spent four years in Shanghai, three of them as MD of Fonterra's China businesses with responsibility for the four key business units of ingredients, consumer, food service and farming. Philip had earlier filled a variety of roles around the world including Director of Government and Trade, GM Strategy, Asia Regional Representative, and EU Trade Policy Manager, living in Brussels, Shanghai and Tokyo as well as Auckland.



Before joining Fonterra in 1999 Philip was a diplomat with the New Zealand Government, including postings in Tokyo and Brussels. He has a First Class MA in history from Auckland University, speaks fluent Japanese, French and some Mandarin, and has a Japanese partner.
